

WVCSD EdTalk: November 23, 2022

Every student has the right to go to school in a place that is safe, friendly, respectful, and cares about them.

The context of alleged bullying among students is extremely important. What can appear to be haphazard and thoughtless behavior may actually be far more dangerous if there is further activity, possibly even occurring online. It is imperative for adults to determine whether or not an occurrence is part of a pattern of purposeful, recurrent acts of cruelty. Online bullying is a little more complicated, but it can also be very harmful and serious, which makes it vital for parents to keep a close eye on what their children are doing on social media. Repeated bullying is associated with a significantly increased risk of developing anxiety, upset, depression, trauma, social rejection, and low grades.

That is the primary position of the Dignity for All Students Act (DASA), passed into law in New York in 2010, and intended to protect all students. The goal of DASA is to make schools safe and supportive places where students can learn and concentrate without worrying about being treated unfairly or being verbally or physically harassed by classmates or school staff. DASA states that no student shall be subjected to harassment or discrimination by employees or students on school property or at a school function based on their actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, sex, gender identity, or expression.

DASA Highlights

Q. Who is protected by the Dignity Act?

A. All public elementary and secondary school students are protected by the Dignity Act.

Q. What does the Dignity Act prohibit?

A. The Dignity Act prohibits the harassment and discrimination of students by students and school personnel.

Q. How does the Dignity Act relate to bullying and hazing?

A. Bullying and hazing are forms of harassment and discrimination.

Q. What physical spaces are covered by the Dignity Act?

A. The Dignity Act applies to behavior on school property (including athletic fields, playgrounds and parking lots), in school buildings, on a school bus/vehicle, as well as at school-sponsored events or activities. The Dignity Act of 2013 has been expanded to include cyber-bullying

defined as harassment by any form of electronic communication, and include incidents occurring off school property that create or would foreseeably create a risk of substantial disruption within the school environment.

Q. How does the Dignity Act relate to the school's Code of Conduct?

A. The Code of Conduct has been amended to reflect the prohibition of discrimination and harassment of students by students and staff – in age-appropriate plain language.
